Legendary NASCAR driver, Richard Petty proudly calls Randleman home and shares his family's legacy and 75 years of history at **Petty Family Attractions.**




Racing history comes alive at Caraway Speedway each week.
This short track was built in 1966 as a dirt track and now hosts drivers on their .455 mile asphalt surface in nearby Sophia.

Do not miss the inviting shops featuring local artists, collectors, and craftsmen in Downtown Randleman. Summertime fun includes the annual **NC Food Truck State Championship** and monthly concerts at **Commerce Square Park.** Find outdoor adventures all year long with prime bass fishing along 100 miles of shoreline at **Randleman Lake** or enjoy a nature hike at Randleman's **Deep River State Trail** access point.



seagrove Pottery

Seagrove, NC

Take a drive down NC Highway 705, also known as Pottery Highway to explore over 80 working potters within a 30-mile radius. Visit shops and galleries that offer year-round events including a **Potters' Pumpkin Patch Trail, Tea with Seagrove Potters,** and **Pottery**

Festival Weekend - held annually the weekend before Thanksgiving. Many of the crafters come from generations of potters in the area making various pieces using clay from the state. Not only is there pottery, but the area is also home to **Seagrove Orchids** and **Carolina Bronze Sculpture Garden & Foundry.** Explore the small local shops selling homemade goods from artists across our great state, including **B3 Artisan Wares and Studio.** Be sure to grab a drink or a snack at **The General Wine & Brew, Asheboro Popcorn Co.**, or **Seagrove Cafe.**





The **North Carolina Zoo** in Asheboro has roughly 5 miles of walking trails to navigate and is one of two state-supported zoos in the United States, with the other being the Minnesota Zoo.

Kersey Valley Attractions

Archdale, NC

Year-round thrills await at Kersey Valley Attractions with their Ziplining, Bomb Bowling, Axe Throwing, Laser Tag, and Escape Rooms. Enjoy seasonal offerings on this 83-acre adventure park with award-winning haunts at Spookywoods - celebrating their 40th anniversary, Maize Adventure, and Lights, Action, Santa! - Kersey Valley Christmas.

Family fun in Archdale is at **Creekside Park & Greenway** with access to three miles of walking trails, state-of-the-art playgrounds, dog park, tennis courts, an orienteering course, and an 18-hole disc golf course. Seasonal events you will not want to miss include outdoor concerts and movies on the lawn. All ages will enjoy the finest live action bull riding at **Davis Ranch** hosting year-round qualifying events and a summertime PBR Invitational each year.

Golfers can play **Holly Ridge Golf Links** for a challenging course or take it indoors to **The Bunker Lounge**, an indoor simulated golf and sports experience while enjoying **Holly Ridge's bar & grill**.

Linbrook Heritage Estate

Trinity, NC

Opened 20 years ago, **Linbrook Heritage Estate** in Trinity is one of the largest privately-owned destinations in the Southeast. Follow along the Neal family history by beginning at the original homestead, **The Historic Hoover House**. Next, **The Neal Agricultural and Industrial Museum** features a large collection of John Deere® Tractors on display while guided tours are offered of **Linbrook Hall**, the Estate's 36,000 sq ft home. The **Trinity Museum/Winslow House**, ca. 1855, is located in the center of


the City of Trinity. It is one of about ten antebellum era houses left in the Old Trinity College (now Duke University) area of Highway 62 in Trinity.

Create memories and form traditions at Ramseur's **Millstone Creek Orchards**, a family-owned u-pick farm experience for the past 20 years providing seasonal tours, children's garden, and the Apple Barn Country Store selling fresh local produce and jarred items. Enjoy unique shopping experiences and charming small town street

festivals in Downtown Ramseur, frequently used for photography and feature films. Discover the remains of a dam and a historic cotton mill built in 1850 at nearby **Deep River State Trail** access points.



Deep River State Trail

Franklinville, NC

Combining history with recreation in Franklinville, the **Deep River State Trail** access points have riverside views perfect for seasonal walking, biking, and jogging. History buffs find **Faith Rock** of interest where in 1782, American Patriot Andrew Hunter escaped by mounting Tory Army leader Fanning's horse to ride down

the steep 75-foot rock into the river, taking the ultimate "leap of faith".



The Liberty Showcase Theate

Liberty & Staley, NC

Liberty is buzzing with musical talent at the historic Liberty Showcase Theater, a premier venue that showcases rising stars and established national talent year-round. Held twice a year, the Liberty Antiques Festival brings over 400 vendors to a 100-acre farm to sell antiques and collectibles to visitors from across the country. Visitors can find seasonal family fun at Whitaker Farms in nearby Climax. Staley's rural land is where the oldest homestead in



Randolph County is located. The Thomas Marley House, built in 1816, is listed on the National Registry of Historic Places.
